CALIDORE STRING QUARTET Performances of the Calidore String Quartet are renowned for their "deep reserves of virtuosity and irrepressible dramatic instinct" (New York Times). Their unique "balance of intellect and expression" (Los Angeles Times) is complemented by the feeling that "four more individual musicians are unimaginable, yet these speak, breathe, think and feel as one" (Washington Post). After over a decade of performances and residencies in the world's most esteemed venues and festivals, the release of numerous critically acclaimed recordings and lauded with significant awards, the Calidore String Quartet is recognized as one of the world's foremost interpreters of a vast repertory; from the cycles of quartets by Beethoven and Mendelssohn to works of celebrated contemporary voices like Grygory Kurtag, Jörg Widmann and Caroline Shaw.

In their most ambitious recording project to date, the Calidore are amidst recording the complete cycle of Beethoven's String Quartets for Signum Records. The recording will involve multiple releases beginning in March 2023. The 22-23 season includes debuts in the Concertgebouw Amsterdam, Prague, Madrid, Vancouver and Key West. Their concert activities also see returns to Wigmore Hall, Kennedy Center, Copenhagen, Florence, Montreal, St. Paul, Houston and Los Angeles. In September 2022, the Calidore performs at Carnegie Hall with violinist Anne-Sophie Mutter, in a memorial concert honoring the late composer Andre Previn. They also enjoy collaborations this season with the Emerson Quartet, clarinetist Anthony McGill, bassist Xavier Foley, violist Matthew Lipman, harpist Bridget Kibbey and pianists Ivo Kahanek and Sophiko Simisive.

Recipient of a 2018 Avery Fisher Career Grant and a 2017 Lincoln Center Emerging Artist Award, the Calidore String Quartet first made international headlines as winner of the \$100,000 Grand Prize of the 2016 M-Prize International Chamber Music Competition. The quartet was the first and only North American ensemble to win the Borletti-Buitoni Trust Fellowship, was a BBC Radio 3 New Generation Artist, and is currently in residence with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center.

Highlights of recent seasons have included performances in major venues throughout North America, Europe, and Asia including Carnegie Hall, Wigmore Hall, the Kennedy Center, Konzerthaus Berlin, Brussels's BOZAR, Cologne Philharmonie, Seoul's Kumho Art Hall, and at significant festivals including the BBC Proms, Verbier, Ravinia, Mostly Mozart, Music@Menlo, Rheingau, East Neuk, and Festspiele Mecklenburg-Vorpommern.

The Calidore has given world premieres of works by Caroline Shaw, Hannah Lash and Mark-Anthony Turnage among others. Its collaborations with esteemed artists and ensembles include Jean-Yves Thibaudet, Marc-André Hamelin, Joshua Bell, David Shifrin, Inon Barnatan, Lawrence Power, Sharon Isbin, David Finckel and Wu Han. The Calidore has collaborated and studied closely with the Emerson Quartet and Quatuor Ébène, and has also studied with Andre Roy, Arnold Steinhardt, Günter Pichler, Guillaume Sutre, Paul Coletti, and Ronald Leonard.

As a passionate supporter of music education, the Calidore String Quartet is committed to mentoring and educating young musicians, students, and audiences. In 2021 the Calidore joined the faculty of the University of Delaware School of Music and serve as directors of the newly established Graduate String Quartet Residency. Formerly, they served as artist-in-residence at the University of Toronto, University of Michigan and Stony Brook University.

The Calidore String Quartet was founded at the Colburn School in Los Angeles in 2010. Within two years, the quartet won grand prizes in virtually all the major US chamber music competitions, including the Fischoff, Coleman, Chesapeake, and Yellow Springs competitions, and it captured top prizes at the 2012 ARD International Music Competition in Munich and the International Chamber Music Competition Hamburg. An amalgamation of "California" and "doré" (French for "golden"), the ensemble's name represents its reverence for the diversity of culture and the strong support it received from its original home: Los Angeles, California, the "golden state."

SELECTION JURY

KYU-YOUNG KIM Artistic Director and Principal Violin of The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Kyu-Young Kim is one of the most versatile and accomplished musicians of his generation. His appointment as the SPCO's Artistic Director in January 2016 marks the first time a playing member has been tapped to take the artistic helm of a major American orchestra. Previously, Kim served as Director of Artistic Planning with the SPCO while continuing to perform in the orchestra. Since assuming his dual role in 2013, the SPCO has named many new Artistic Partners, opened its new Concert Hall at the Ordway Center for the Performing Arts to great critical acclaim, toured throughout the



U.S. and to Europe, and won a Grammy Award in 2018 for its disc of Schubert's Death and the Maiden with violinist Patricia Kopatchinskaja. Kim has also toured throughout the world as a founding member of the Daedalus Quartet with whom he won the Grand Prize at the 2001 Banff International String Quartet Competition and was a member of Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center's Chamber Music Two Program. As a former member of the Pacifica String Quartet, Mr. Kim won the prestigious Naumburg Chamber Music Award. He has appeared as soloist with the Korea Broadcasting System (KBS) Symphony Orchestra, The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Amadeus Chamber Orchestra of Poland and the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra. He has served as guest concertmaster of the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Minnesota Orchestra, and the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra, and is an Emeritus Member of the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. Kim is on the violin faculty of the University of Minnesota School of Music and has done guest master classes in violin and chamber music throughout the United States and Canada.

LAURIE CARNEY A founding member of the American String Quartet, Laurie Carney comes from a prodigious musical family. Her father was a trumpeter and educator, her mother a pianist, and her three siblings all violinists. She began her studies at home and at the age of 8 became the youngest violinist ever to be admitted to the Preparatory Division of the Juilliard School. At 15 she was the youngest to be accepted into Juilliard's College Division. Ms. Carney studied with Dorothy DeLay and received both BM and MM degrees from Juilliard. She has shared the stage with many of the



world's leading artists, including Isaac Stern, Yefim Bronfman, Pinchas Zukerman, and Frederica von Stade, and been featured in Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante with the Bournemouth Symphony and the Basque (Spain) Symphony Orchestra. Ms. Carney frequently performs duo recitals with Guarneri Quartet violist Michael Tree. She was featured in the New York premiere of Giampaolo Bracali's Fantasia.

A member of the Manhattan School of Music faculty and the faculty of Aspen Music School, she has held teaching positions at the Mannes College of Music, Peabody Conservatory, the University of Nebraska, and the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University. Her frequent master classes have taken her to California, Colorado, Indiana, Michigan, and New Mexico. Ms. Carney performs the duo repertory with her husband, cellist William Grubb. Her nonprofessional interests include animal rights and environmental concerns. Her violin is by Carlo Tononi (Venice, 1720).

ELIZABETH OAKES, violist, is an active chamber musician, chamber music coach and per-



former. A dedicated teacher, Ms. Oakes currently runs the Chamber Music Residency Program at the University of Iowa and serves as the director of the University of Iowa String Quartet Residency Program (UISQRP). For twenty-two years, Ms. Oakes was the violist of the Maia Quartet and as a member of the Quartet, she performed throughout the United States, Asia, Canada, and Europe and concertized in major venues including Alice Tully Hall, Merkin Hall, the 92nd Street Y and Washington DC's Kennedy Center. Ms. Oakes has taught at numerous summer music festivals including the Interlochen Advanced String

Quartet Program, the Great Wall International Music Academy in Beijing, China and the Rocky Mountain Summer Conservatory in Steamboat Springs, Colorado and she currently directs the Green Lake Festival of Music Chamber Music Institute.

Ms. Oakes programming and interdisciplinary interests have led her to coordinate and program many large-scale projects. In 1997, Ms. Oakes co-founded and then subsequently served for nine years as a co-artistic director of the Foothills Music Festival in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. In her current role as the director of UISQRP, Ms. Oakes has created multi-dimensional artist-residencies with artists from across the US and abroad, including the Brentano Quartet, JACK, the Cavani Quartet, the Parker Quartet, the Elias Quartet, the Dalí Quartet, the Harlem Quartet, the Jupiter Quartet, the Jasper Quartet, the Pacifica Quartet, the Miró Quartet and the Castalian Quartet. She has been the recipient of numerous grants from major granting organizations, such as Chamber Music America, the Iowa Arts Council, Humanities Iowa, the University of Iowa's Ida Cordelia Beam Distinguished Professorship Program and the John and Anna Hanes Foundation.


Ms. Oakes has received repeated recognition for her work at the University of Iowa. In 2016, she was awarded the Dean's Distinguished Lecturer award in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and in 2022-21, she was awarded the President & Provost Award for Teaching Excellence. Most recently, she was awarded the Distinguished Professor of Instruction upon her promotion to full professor and will oversee the newly formed Dunn Graduate String Quartet at the University of Iowa School of Music.


KARL LAVINE is Principal cellist for the Madison Symphony Orchestra and the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. As a member of the Madison Symphony Orchestra's Heartstrings

Quartet Program, Karl performs in many special needs communities throughout the Madison area. Karl appears regularly at John and Rose Mary Harbison's Token Creek Festival in Wisconsin. He has held faculty positions at Luther College, Illinois Wesleyan University and UW Whitewater. As a past member of the Milwaukee based contemporary music ensemble, Present Music, Karl has recorded compositions with the ensemble as well as solo repertoire. He is also a member of the Kepler Quartet, a string quartet which resulted from performances of works of American composer Ben Johnston. With the help of generous grants from the Aaron Copland Recording Foundation and support from New World Records, the Kepler Quartet has recently finished re-



cording the complete string quartets of Ben Johnston under the New World Records label.

I am always impressed with quality leadership no matter what field it resides in. Leadership takes time, effort, and patience to achieve positive results. In music leadership manifests as excellence in preparation, and honesty in performance. In chamber music, that can be expressed in terms of a collaborative sharing of ideas and a willingness to step up together in a concerted process. In string quartet parlance leadership is achieved only through PRACTICE: Performances, Rehearsals, Accountability to colleagues, Communication of ideas, Time-Management, Individual preparation, Collaboration 11 ways, and Enjoyment.

The Saint Paul String Quartet Competition brings people together to celebrate beauty in the intimate environs of chamber music broadcast to the world. The Final Rounds of the competition showcase the best prepared and the most dedicated college string quartets currently in the country. These four superb college age quartets will share with us today some of the most beautiful music ever composed.

Today's jury is the excellent **Calidore String Quartet.** They will listen to and score each performance with detailed written comments in the following categories: *Tone Quality, Intonation, Ensemble & Balance, and Musical Ideas.*

The 2023 event begins with a compulsory work by Chinese-Canadian composer Kevin Lau, and closes with a self-curated 30 minute program from each finalist quartet. The individual and ensemble skill and level of preparation will emerge for these aspiring ensembles. It will also be a challenge for our esteemed jury as they search for today's prizewinners.

Described as a "self-assured voice" (Barczablog) with a "masterful control over his idiom" (Classical Music Sentinel), **Kevin Lau** has established himself as one of Canadas leading young composers. Awarded the 2017 Victor Martyn Lynn-Staunton Award by the Canada Council for Outstanding Achievement, Kevin's music has been commissioned and performed by ensembles across North America, including

the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, National Arts Centre Orchestra, Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, Niagara Symphony Orchestra, Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra, Tampa Bay Symphony Orchestra, Ensemble Made in Canada, Octagon, Piano Six, the Hannaford Street Silver Band, TorQ, and the Houston-based River Oaks Chamber Orchestra. Recent collaborators on new works include violinist Jonathan Crow, clarinetist Yao Guang Zhai, cellist Rachel Mercer, violinist Scott St. John, erhu soloist Andy Lin, oboist Charles Hamann, and oboist Caitlin Broms-



Jacobs. In 2021 he will serve as Composer in Residence for the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra.

In 2016 Kevin composed the score for the National Ballet of Canada's original full-length ballet Le Petit Prince, featuring choreography by NBOC Principal Dancer and Choreographic Associate Guillaume Cote. His second ballet score, Dark Angels, was commissioned by the National Arts Centre Orchestra for its Encount3rs project in 2017, and was described as riveting (Ottawa Citizen) and extraordinarily accomplished (Artsfile). His most recent large-scale work, an opera-film hybrid (Bound) commissioned by Against the Grain Theatre and recorded by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, was hailed by the Globe and Mail as "a brilliant creation."

Kevins discography includes two JUNO award-winning albums: "Detach" (Redshift) featuring harpist Angela Schwarzkopf, and "Mosaique" featuring Ensemble Made in Canada. Other albums include "Solo Seven" (ATMA Classique) featuring violinist Marc Djokic, which won Best Album at the 2020 East Coast Music Awards; the JUNO-nominated "Spin Cycle" (Centrediscs, featuring the Afiara Quartet and DJ Skratch Bastid); "Encount3rs" (Analekta) featuring NACO; "The Sounds of Our Time" (Naxos) featuring cellist Rachel Mercer, and Premieres (Cambria Records) featuring violinist Conrad Chow.

In addition to composing concert music, Kevin is also active as a film composer, arranger, and pianist. He has written the scores to over a dozen films, including Ben Shirinian's Lulu (which won Best International Short Film at the 2020 Milan International Film Festival) and Charles Officer's acclaimed feature documentary Invisible Essence: The Little Prince (2018), and has created arrangements for artists such as singer-songwriters Sarah Slean, Dan Mangan, and Suzie McNeil; composer Christos Hatzis; and groups such as the Art of Time Ensemble. He has performed many of his own works and collaborates frequently with artists such as Scott St. John (violin), Lynn Kuo (violin), and Victor Cheng (piano).

Born in Hong Kong, Kevin moved to Toronto at the age of 7. In 2012 he received his doctorate in music composition from the University of Toronto under the supervision of Christos Hatzis, and has guest-lectured at UofT for the past six years. He served as Composer in Residence for the Mississauga Symphony Orchestra (2010-12), the Banff Centre (2012), and was artistic director of the Sneak Peek Orchestra (with conductor and co-founder Victor Cheng) until 2014. He was the youngest composer to be appointed RBC Affiliate Composer for the Toronto Symphony Orchestra (2012-15), and was composer in residence of the Niagara Symphony Orchestra from 2018-19.

Upcoming projects include The Spirit Horse Returns, an orchestral children's concert about the origins of the Ojibwe Horse for the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra (featuring Anishinaabe storyteller Jodi Contin and Metis-Ojibwe artist Rhonda Snow); and Kimiko's Pearl, a multi-disciplinary collaboration about the internment of Japanese Canadians during WWII, featuring chamber ensemble, sound design, and dancers from the Royal Winnipeg Ballet.

String Quartet No.3 - II. Winds of Change Composer: Kevin Lau

My Third String Quartet represents a broad attempt to weave some of my cherished musical influences into a coherent whole. In an effort to explore the roots of my musical identity, I have tried to find common ground among a diverse array of perspectives. The first movement, "Gliding," follows an arch-like structure in which a lyrical melody, part Far East folk song and part Renaissance chorale, bookends a middle section inspired by the driving rhythms of progressive heavy metal. These disparate elements are united by an ever-shifting ground of odd meters; and with it, a sense of free-flowing spontaneity and abandon.

The second movement, "Winds of Change," is based on an earlier work of mine that I have adapted many times for different ensembles. In this version, the theme -- a buoyant, minor-key dance in 6/8 -- competes with wry quotations from Christian Petzold's famous Minuet in G against the backdrop of an aggressive drone suggestive of world-music-inflected electronica. At times these references collide uneasily, threatening to blow apart the entire discourse; ultimately, however, the movement is a celebration of the joyous urgency which lies beneath the surface of all music-making.

Winner of the <u>BIPOC Round</u> will be announced at the Awards Ceremony which follows immediately after the Final Round.

The Poiesis Quartet was founded in Oberlin, OH during Oberlin Conservatory's Advanced String Quartet program. In January 2023, the quartet completed an international tour in Uruguay with artistic residencies in Punta del Diablo and Punta del Este's premiere concert series, "Conciertos del Este". Performances included the world premiere of Alejandro Melo's' composition "Elegy" which was dedicated to the quartet. This year, they were selected as finalists in the St. Paul String Quartet Competition and quarterfinalists in the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition and are the recipients of Fischoff's Lift Every Voice Prize. They are also grateful to have performed in masterclasses with Sandy Yamamoto of the Miró Quartet, Jinjoo Cho, and Matt Albert. The Poiesis Quartet is primarily coached by Sibbi Bernhardsson of the Pacifica Quartet and is additionally mentored by the Verona Quartet and Kirsten Docter of the Cavani Quartet.

Comprised of violinists Sarah Ma and Max Ball, cellist Drew Dansby, and violist Jasper de Boor, members of the Poiesis Quartet have attended programs such as Kneisel Hall, the Perlman Music Program, Verbier Festival, Aspen Music Festival, and Madeline Island Chamber Music's Fellowship program. In addition to quartet, Sarah and Drew are also completing Bachelor's degrees in American Studies and Chemistry (respectively), Jasper is double majoring in violin and viola performance with a minor in baroque violin, and Max is pursuing a minor in jazz studies. When not playing chamber music, Poiesis loves to learn new languages on Duolingo, share delicious ice cream cakes, and take long walks on the beach.

The name Poiesis is derived from the ancient Greek word TTOLETV, which means "to make". Heidegger refers to poiesis as a 'bringing-forth', the "blooming of the blossom, the coming-out of a butterfly from a cocoon, the plummeting of a waterfall when the snow begins to melt". The Quartet strives to replicate the notion of poiesis in our art-making.

Hailed as a "tantalizing glimpse of potential future greatness" (Epoch Times), violinist Sarah Ma is currently pursuing a double-degree (B.M./B.A.) at Oberlin College and Conservatory with Prof. Sibbi Bernhardsson after transferring from B.M. studies at The Juilliard School, where she studied with Donald Weilerstein and Li Lin, as well as with Masao Kawasaki in the Juilliard Pre-College Division. She has performed internationally with Ensemble 212, the Washington Heights Chamber Orchestra, New York Concerti Sinfonietta, the Accademia D'Archi Arrigoni, and more. Sarah was featured in Show 393 on NPR's "From the Top" and was a winner of the 2021 National YoungArts Competition. She has attended the Heifetz International Music Institute and was the Dorothy Richard Starling fellow at Aspen Music Festival for several summers as a student of Robert Lipsett, Donald Weilerstein, and Paul Kantor. As a laureate of the 2019 Cooper International Competition, Sarah was sponsored by Florian Leonhard Fine Violins and the Anthony Quinn Foundation and performed on an 1828 Vuillaume. She is also grateful to have worked with Almita Vamos, Shmuel Ashkenasi, Robert Levin, Aaron Rosand, Sarah Chang, and Ray Chen, among others. As a chamber musician, Sarah was a fellow at the 2022 Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival and participated in Oberlin's Advanced String Quartet Program. Her chamber group, the Poiesis Quartet, recently completed artistic residencies abroad in Uruguay, and were selected to compete in the 2023 St Paul String Quartet Competition and Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. Sarah is the recipient of the Oberlin Conservatory Dean's Scholarship, the John F. Oberlin Scholarship, and is a 2023 Benjamin A. Gilman Scholar as selected by the U.S. Department of State.

Max Ball (he/him) is a violinist in his third year at Oberlin Conservatory, studying with Sibbi Bernhardsson. He has a particular passion for chamber music, putting together a number of recitals, and attending summer programs such as the BUTI String Quartet Intensive, Encore Chamber Music Institute, and Madeline Island Fellowship Program. He is a member of the Poiesis Quartet, which has completed a number of international artistic residencies in Uruguay, and will be competing in the St. Paul String Quartet Competition and Fischoff Competition in the spring of 2023. Alongside classical music, he is also pursuing a minor in jazz studies, studying under Gerald Cannon and Jay Ashby, and joining several ensembles at Oberlin. A particular highlight is the PI (performance and improvisation) ensemble, in which players across all departments of the conservatory join forces with guest artists from around the world, playing many varied styles of music.

Jasper de Boor is finishing their 4th year at Oberlin conservatory studying violin and viola with David Bowlin and Kirsten Docter. Aside from their two majors, they love to sight read music, play baroque violin, piano and sleep.

Drew Dansby (he/him/his), 22, is a third-year double-degree student at Oberlin College, studying cello under Darrett Adkins and majoring in chemistry. Drew is a cellist in the Poiesis Quartet at Oberlin, which will compete in the St. Paul String Quartet Competition and the Fischoff Competition in 2023, and the Charlotte Piano Trio, which has performed 13 concerts across North Carolina. Drew was an acting section cellist in the Charlotte Symphony for the 2021-22 season. He is a National YoungArts winner and gold medalist in the Cleveland Cello Society competition. Drew was a member of the National Youth Orchestra of the USA for three summers, including as a violinist in 2018 and as principal cellist in 2019, and he was the first member in the history of the orchestra to be accepted on two instruments. The Lora Quartet, comprised of members Alyssa Tong and Matthew Vousé (violins), Hannah Wendorf (viola), and Elmer Carter III (cello), was formed in 2022 at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. They are mentored by SFCM's quartet-in-residence, the Telegraph Quartet, and are primarily coached by Telegraph violinist Eric Chin. They have played in masterclasses for the Parker, Miró, Kronos, and Chiaroscuro Quartets, and were invited to participate in the Ralston White Retreat, an intensive chamber music winter term project run by the Telegraph Quartet. Recently, they performed with the Kronos Quartet and Post ballet as part of the Kronos Project, a collaboration between several San Francisco Bay Area arts organizations, performing multiple pieces from the 50 for the Future Library, which is a rich collection of newly commissioned works for string quartet. They have also worked with Paul Wiancko, Jean-Michel Fonteneau, Sunny Yang, and the Valley Concert Chorale. Especially passionate about contemporary music, the quartet has performed works by Clarice Assad, Ken Benshoof, Nicole Lizee, and Joan Jeanrenaud, and has presented traditional and contemporary works for both formal concerts and community outreach. She is passionate about increasing accessibility to classical music, which includes revitalizing the concert stage, providing quality music education to youth, and opening conversations around careers and holistic musicianship.

Hailing from New York, **Matthew Vousé** is a violinist dedicated to upholding the traditions of his field as well as reimagining what it means to be a classical musician in the 21st century. 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
